This Spring Semester Class

• This semester long class looks at **current trends** in English language children's literature. What issues are facing children's literature in the 21st century? How are these similar to and different from the past? What issues are particularly relevant to parents and teachers as well as scholars of literature? Issues such as multiculturalism, feminism, and methods of analyzing texts will be considered. In addition, there will be an emphasis on **poetry** and on **picture books** and their design.
